Childhood Seasonal Flu Vaccination Programme

over the coming years for all children aged 2 to 16 inclusive.

After a series of pilot programmes across the country, this is being rolled out to all children in school Years 1 & 2 in mainstream schools during the Autumn term 2015 and to all children and staff in special schools. Lincolnshire Community Health Services School Nursing service has been commissioned to deliver this. The School Nursing service is very experienced in delivery of school-based vaccination programmes and participated in the childhood seasonal flu pilot to Years 7 & 8 in mainstream secondary schools and to all staff and pupils in identified special schools during 2014-15. The majority of children will receive the Fluenz Tetra® nasal vaccine. This is a live vaccine and is used because it provides the most effective protection against flu in children. However there are a small number of children who should not have a nasal vaccine because of their health condition. These include:

Children with severe asthma.

Children who have previously experienced a severe allergic reaction to eggs or to

Children who have a condition that weakens their immune system or who live in a family where a family member has a severely weakened immune system, e.g. bone marrow transplant.

These conditions include asthma, having a lowered immunity due to disease or treatment, a heart condition or a disability. Children with any of these health conditions who are unable to have the nasal spray will be offered the injectable flu vaccine. Any children in these groups who have never previously had a flu vaccination will require two doses four weeks apart. The second dose is given at the GP surgery.
